SMALL TOWN GIRL WHO DARED TO DREAM BIG

Laying flat on the ground and waiting for the instructor's command to fire, is one lasting memory in the mind of every cadet who has passed out of the National Cadet Corps (NCC). And to hit the target, at least once, under the baking sun, one had to be mentally strong and prepared to do the hard work. It was precisely these two qualities that NCC ingrained in young Tejaswini Sawant, who recently became the first Indian woman to win a World Shooting Championship.

But then the glory days as a sharp shooter in NCC khakis is no passport to success and Tejaswini realised soon that the road to become a renowned shooter is full of impediments – be it the cash crunch to buy the rifle or the lack of facilities to train. If her Dad's support and confidence saw her through the initial period of struggle, it was her inner strength and her father's blessings from heaven that took her to the top of the podium in Munich just months after her father passed away.

That she came from a state which had already produced several champion shooters helped as Tejaswini looked up to emulate the likes of Anjali Vedpathak Bhagwat, the first Indian woman to be ranked No. 1 in the world. The Kolhapur girl was an unknown rookie when Anjali excelled at the Manchester Commonwealth Games in 2002, but four years later, Tejaswini hit the bull's eye and the headlines as she piped her didis (Anjali and Suma Shirur) to make it to the Indian team for the Melbourne Games.

India's rifle coach, Lazlo Scuzak, of the Czech Republic, was sure then that he had found two potential champions in Tejaswini and Avneet Kaur Sidhu and at

the 50th World Championship, the Kolhapuri proved that her former coach was spot on. There was no looking back from Melbourne as Teju continued her hard work and slowly overtook Avneet. Soon, she was ranked in the top-15 in World Rankings and also made the grade for the World Cup finals where only the season's best get to compete.

Disappointment and dejection knocked on her doors when she failed to qualify for the Beijing Olympics in 2008, but she hung on to emerge on top of the world.

As we get ready to celebrate Independence Day, the success story of Tejaswini, a small town girl who chased big dreams, should be told many times over. It will surely inspire millions of her fellow citizens to gun for glory. May she win more laurels for the country and emulate Abhinav Bindra, at the London Games!
